Almost one in ten adults are chemically dependent, and one in three people in the USA are living with or closely related to someone with an alcohol or other drug problem. Alcoholics and addicts are among our family, friends, coworkers, and neighbors, in every sector of our society.

Through their work in intervention, the Jays have found that love is a powerful force for confronting addiction. Unlike practitioners who espouse a “tough love” approach to addiction, Jeff and Debra Jay have noted that love breaks through denial more effectively than toughness. Using love first and a carefully planned approach, “tough love” often becomes unnecessary.

People who care about an addict/alcoholic do not cause the disease of chemical dependency, and they can not control or cure it. Through the intervention process, people who care - family members, friends, neighbors, employers, clergy, and anyone else in a position to influence a chemically dependent person who needs help – learn what they can do to influence the person’s decision to get help.

Jeff and Debra Jay are dynamic, highly experienced speakers whose presentations are liberally interwoven with compassion, humor, personal stories and real-life descriptions. The experiences they share from their work in the intervention field will shatter myths that have kept chemically dependent individuals and their families from getting help and getting well.
