## "THIS PLACE RUNS ON LOVE."

That's what a young man at Spera said recently. He was reflecting on the tremendous sense of family he felt—in this place where he had arrived in such pain.

The people we help at Dawn Farm are wounded men and women who, because of addiction, live on the margins of society. But we never, ever give up on any of them.

Because Dawn Farm really does run on **love**.

One of our favorite friends is William White, the brilliant author and historian. His words are posted at all the entrances of all our sites:

- You are in the right place.
- You are with others like yourself.
- We understand you and the world you come from.
- We accept who you are and who you can become.
- This is a place where magic (change) can happen.

Our experience shows that real, lasting recovery from addiction is available to everyone, and that our job is to create spaces that afford struggling individuals the chance to grow and strengthen.

We do it with detox and residential services, outpatient and sober housing, outreach and education. But most of all, the fuel that drives this organization is love.

I spoke with two men as we were completing this Annual Report. One was a recovering heroin addict who came here in 1977. He spoke warmly about his retirement and his grandchildren, because he is now in his mid-60's—and has *more than forty years* of abstinent recovery.

The other was a 21-year old I interviewed at the request of his anxious family. He was belligerent and resistant to being helped, but he finally agreed to detox at Spera "for a few days."

A week later, I ran into him on a sunny afternoon and was surprised to hear him gratefully tell me how the care he had received at Spera inspired his decision to enter treatment and then sober

housing. "Thanks for giving me this opportunity."

These are just two stories—among thousands. But both of these guys are part of a community—that believes recovery is available to anyone. **You** made this happen.

An Annual Report is intended to provide relevant information to stakeholders. But we also hope to reveal more about who we are and what drives us. We have enclosed a card about our mission and values, things that are elemental to our work—and to our success.

Here's how many people we helped this year. We want you to realize the sheer volume of people who come to us and are welcomed, each one a unique story of redemption and recovery:

Chapin Street Project	355 individuals

Huge numbers, to be sure—but each individual was affected by the *love* of this community.

In the marketplace of ideas, we see a lot of disturbing trends—programs driven by money and ideology, leaving addicts and alcoholics behind.

But with the support of people like you, we never shut the door here. Sometimes I joke that it's "stuck open." In the face of a disease that shatters both its victims and their families, we continue to embrace the healing power of love.

One of our heroes is Father Greg Boyle from Homeboy Industries, who works with gang members in East LA. He says, "If love is the answer, community is the context."

This means that the love that runs this place also partly comes from you. Thank you.
